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
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

# something must be done

NRA Secretary General, **Andrew Mercer,** introduces the Summer issue.



There are other consequences. Training Ukrainian forces on MoD ranges is severely restricting NRA civilian club access to military ranges; this problem is expected to continue well into next year.

Furthermore energy costs have risen to extraordinary levels. The NRA's electricity bill for April this year was  $\pounds 54,000$  compared to  $\pounds 19,000$  last year. Inflation continues to pummel household budgets and the ability for NRA members and clubs to pay for life essentials such as target hire and ammunition.

Looking further ahead we need to pay attention, work with our colleagues from other shooting organisations, and bring our resources to bear to ensure that proposed legislative changes do not damage target shooting.

Horrific murders in Plymouth and Epsom College by shotgun certificate holders inevitably produced calls for "something must be done". It is easy for statutory bodies to focus on largely irrelevant initiatives such as requiring shotguns to be treated as Section 1 firearms. Proposals to restrict the amount of shotgun ammunition held on certificate, and variations to acquire additional shotguns would generate wholly unnecessary administration. The focus must surely be on ensuring police firearms licensing staff are properly trained and resourced, and focus their efforts assessing the suitability of applicants and certificate holders.

UK Reach's work to draft legislation banning lead in ammunition is progressing. We have worked hard to make the case that lead can be properly managed on rifle ranges. A



visit by the HSE and Environmental Agency earlier this year proved very helpful in demonstrating how lead is managed at Bisley and regional rifle ranges. However the prospects for retaining lead shot for clay shooting are poor. We have invested considerable resources working with other shooting organisations to ensure our responses and presentations to UK Reach are consistent and credible. I expect an update from UK Reach in early July.

Firearms fees, unchanged since 2016, will also be increased significantly as a result of the current review. We have been engaged in robust discussions with the Home Office to ensure police cost recovery is fair and reasonable. It is in our interests to have professional, efficient and properly resourced police firearms licensing teams; and reasonable for certificate holders and applicants to pay their fair share of the costs incurred.

Much of the work we do with the MoD, government, police and other statutory bodies goes unreported, and there is often a fine balance between the need to be effective and the need to secure credit for our efforts.

Despite battling such vigorous head winds I remain optimistic. NRA membership ended 2022 at 10,200 and continues to grow. Our ranges are busy. Participation in our competitions is holding up. And we are quietly fettling up site 103, the gateway to Bisley Camp acquired in December last year. The dreaded asbestos has been removed and we have started the long but exciting job of renovating the buildings.

The Imperial Meeting is bearing down upon us at a rate of knots and we are looking forward to welcoming target shooters from across the world to Bisley. HM The King's Prize will be awarded on Saturday 22nd July; I hope to see you on Stickledown range on the day for this great celebration of marksmanship.  $\odot$

n 2020, around 100 hopefuls submitted an application to be a part of the 2023
Palma Squad. One global pandemic later, the schedule for the Individual World Championship and Palma Matches slipped a year to 2024 and departure day for the GB Palma recce-tour marked 883 days since the initial squad had been selected.

Complete with new GB caps Hannah Cook (GB TR cap number 936), Nick Healy (937)

and Jason Pepera-Hibbert (938), the team was ready to travel. Six team members had flown to Kenya with the England team the previous week and we planned to meet them in Bloemfontein the following day.

Whilst we experienced a somewhat easier time of it than the England team the preceding week, the usual challenge of transporting dozens of people, firearms and a few thousand rounds of ammunition reared its head at Heathrow Airport. We were grateful to James Watson's

excellent preparation and the Virgin Atlantic staff for doing their utmost to smooth our passage through security and customs. Mercifully, the flight left on time with us all on-board.

Landing in Johannesburg the following morning, we met up with Glyn Barnett (who had flown directly from his home in UAE), collected and loaded our hire vehicles and began the 4-hour drive to Bloemfontein. The next day was spent settling into the hotel, shopping, preparing ammunition and even some range trips.

Thursday 9 March was our first practice day on the General de Wet range complex; a warm, sunny whole-day affair with temperatures reaching the low thirties by lunchtime. Somewhat different conditions to the snow laying on the ground back in the UK! Our sun-starved, winterised bodies enjoyed a healthy dose of vitamin D as we shot 10 rounds at each of 300, 700. 800 and 900 metres. Nigel Ball particularly enjoyed himself, scoring a healthy

200 ex 200. We also enjoyed the opportunity to test the wireless headsets, carbon fibre tripods and Kowa Highlander spotting scopes provided to us by team sponsors Swatcom, 3LeggedThing and Clearview Scopes and Stands.

The Free State
Championships provided
another warm up opportunity
on Friday 10 March with 10
rounds to count at 300, 600,
800 and 900m. The short range
aggregate was won by Matthew
Ensor with 105.13. The long
range and overall competitions
were won by Johan G du Toit.

Saturday 11 March saw various members of the team declare their intention to win the Scottish Sword competition. Particularly tricky winds at 900m tested all competitors but Nigel Ball continued his fine form with a 102.10 to take the win from Captain Jeremy Langley after a tie shoot. GB took 8 of the top 10 positions. Our attempts to shoot alongside the Hamilton Cup club teams match that afternoon were curtailed as we were treated to an epic storm, ▶

accompanied by a fabulous lightning display. Shooting was cancelled for the afternoon, as the GB vehicles returned to the hotel to avoid getting stranded on an increasingly waterlogged range.

After a day off on Sunday, the 83rd SABU Open Championships started on Monday 13 March with the Free State Cup at 300 and 600m, followed by the King's Norton Cup at 600m. As the dust settled, Glyn Barnett showed the rest of the competition how to do it, to lead with a very tidy 155.21 ex 155.31. The GB team shot alongside the Dewar club teams match that afternoon, building our experience as a coaching and shooting unit on the range.

Tuesday's dawn broke with slightly cooler air and a fresh breeze. Five members of the GB team scored a full house of 105 in the Dalrymple

Messrs Healy, Ensor, Nelson and Underwood all pipped by David Luckman's superior vee count as he placed 2nd overall. The Dave Smith Cup at 900m showed the strength of competition with only two GB team members in the top 10. We spent the afternoon shooting alongside team matches and were delighted to be present as the GB Under 25s won their RSA International teams match by 12 points from South Africa, including 50s at 900m from Jemima Hince, Miles Horton-Baker and Elliot Sewell. This was a winning performance strongly influenced by the teamwork

and tactics employed by coach Toby Little and team captain, Harriet Bramwell. The future of GB shooting looks strong.

The Jack Mitchley and President Cup were shot on the Wednesday morning, ahead of the first of two international teams matches. Very calm early conditions meant high scores and Glyn Barnett, Matthew Ensor and David Luckman shot 50.9 to join 3 others in a tie shoot later that week, which David won. The President Cup followed as the wind picked up. James Watson scored an impressive 100.7 to win the competition outright, ahead of Parag in 2nd with 99.13.

and, competing against them for the first time in our history, England. The course of fire and team size was adapted this year, to provide teams with an opportunity to experience Palma Match-style competition on the same range that would host the 2024 Palma Match.

At 800m, the light winds were welcomed by our coaches but not by the shooters as there was little breeze to keep cool in the heat of the day. As the shoot progressed the breeze remained light, but very fickle, and coaches had to work hard to keep the groups centred on the target. Overall South Africa took the range by

6 points. GB were second, with a 13-point lead over USA in third, with England trailing by a further 30 points.

At 900m, conditions were much the same, although a couple of degrees cooler. When the final scores were tallied, the South African team had managed to pull ahead by a further 4 points, leaving GB in second by 10 points, USA in 3rd, and England in 4th. South Africa were clearly delighted by their win, following an

afternoon of fierce but friendly competition.

Thursday saw the State
President 1st stage followed
by the final two shoots of
the Grand Aggregate; The
Municipal Cup at 800m and
Col. R Bodley Memorial Match
at 900m. In the State President,
Parag Patel emerged at the top
of the GB pile with 105.15.
He and David Luckman then
stunned us all by delivering a
pair of fabulous 50.8s in the
Municipal Cup, David winning

the tie shoot the following day. Chris Mitchell showed the rest of us how it was done with a 50.4 at 900m to place 3rd overall.

Parag Patel's consistently excellent shooting meant he emerged victorious in the SA Grand Aggregate with a score of 658.73. Nigel Ball placed 3rd in the Veterans Aggregate behind American Trudie Fay, who also won the Norma Seyfferdt Trophy ahead of GB's Rosanne Furniss in 2nd. Jemima Hince won the U25 Aggregate, ahead of teammate Tom Shaw in 3rd.

Friday saw us compete in the State President 2nd stage. Theo Dodds was top scorer on the range with an impeccable 150.22 to add to his 105.13 from the first stage, meaning he was also the highest-scoring qualifier for the final the following day.

That afternoon some of the team relaxed off the range and others remained close by to support the U25s in their Protea Match. The GBU25 took an impressive 16-point lead at 800m in changeable conditions. At 900m the cloud cover had increased which meant less readable mirage and

the potential for more points being lost to wind. Some fast shooting saw GB win their second match, this time with a 14-point margin overall. The GB team ventured back to the hotel to prepare for the following morning's Protea Match.

### **PROTEA MATCH**

Considered the most prestigious team match in South Africa, this was GB's 15th appearance. With only 3 previous wins in that time, it is well known to be the most challenging of international team matches. Like the RSA International on Wednesday, the course of fire was adapted this year to 16 firers on 4 targets, this time shooting 10 shots to count at 700, 800 and 900 metres.

A fresh Easterly breeze greeted us as we arrived at the range. As it happened, the conditions at 700m were fairly benign; a steady 2.5-4 minutes from the left. This was very much a shooters range with such steady conditions and a big target, but this is a big match and we were determined to give a good performance. The pressure was on.

### GB had overcome a twopoint deficit to emerge victorious by a single point

By the end of 700m, GB had only dropped 2 points, finishing with 798 and 119 v-bulls, but our South African hosts managed a perfect score of 800 with a slightly lower V-count of 107. England came in 3rd, dropping 8 points, and the USA in 4th.

Moving back to 800m, conditions were similar, but slightly more variable. A 2-4.5 minute bracket, but still readable and fairly steady. South Africa scored 798. GB also lost a pair, finishing on an identical score, both teams with 103 V-bulls. South Africa retained a 2-point lead from GB with USA dropping 6 at this range, putting them into 3rd place ahead of England.

As we finished at 800m and started to walk back to 900m, the cloud cover broke and the sun came out. Immediately, we were faced with the more typical conditions experienced over the past two weeks; a much more variable, fast-changing and fickle wind.

The bracket was about 1-6 minutes left, with occasional hints of right mirage. Our coaches elected to stop firing if the wind was hinting to come from the right, leading to a few pauses in this fastpaced match. The challenging conditions were reflected in the scores, with rather more points being lost. GB and SA were fighting tooth and nail for the match, each set of scores flipping the top positions, while USA and England had fallen off the pace of the two leading teams.

As South African and British tactics diverged for the last two firers on each target, GB still had three firers on the point with 5 minutes remaining. Keeping incredibly cool under pressure Rick Shouler, Jon Underwood, and Paul Sykes held steady until the final minute. Finishing with seconds to spare, the range collectively held its breath awaiting the final scores. When all scores were tallied,



GB had overcome a two-point deficit to emerge victorious by a single point over SA. USA finished in 3rd, and England were 4th.

Cue some delight and some short-lived celebrations before attention turned back to individual competition and the State President Final that afternoon.

### STATE PRESIDENT COMPETITION

The State President competition was completed on Saturday afternoon. Neels Jonck of South Africa showed the rest of the range a clean pair of heels with an incredible score of 300 ex 300. In the fast-changing and punishing wind conditions of the final, this truly was a shoot for the ages. He was rightly rewarded with a 1st place in the

South African Open Championships too, with Parag Patel the top-placed GB team member in 5th.

After prize giving we were treated to another wonderful lightning storm as we ventured happily back into Bloemfontein for a celebratory dinner.

Packing the following morning was a challenge for some but we managed to load all people and kit into the vehicles for 9:30am and leave the hotel in good time for the drive back to Johannesburg. After a relatively uneventful flight, GB landed in the early hours of Monday morning before dispersing from Bisley later that day.

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# GREAT BRITAIN F-TR WINS BRONZE AT THE F-CLASS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Peter Dommett reports on Great Britain FTR Team's Bronze win in South Africa, March-April 2023.

elayed since 2021, GB-FTR has now returned from the 2023 F-Class World Championships bearing Bronze Medals following two gruelling weeks of team and individual competition on the renowned General De Wet range near Bloemfontein in South Africa.

As a warm-up ahead of the World Championships, all competitors were invited to compete in the Free State Open and the South African Open... early successes for the GB FTR contingent included 1st Place (Gold) for Peter Sheffield in the Free State Grand Aggregate, and 8th Place overall in the SA Open Grand Aggregate for Matt Jarram.

The first taste of team shooting on the range also gave GB FTR a very credible bronze medal in the 13-man

Protea International event, just two points behind the USA in silver, with South Africa taking gold. A foretaste of things to come in the FCWC perhaps?

Moving into the World Championship individuals, the team felt confident that their

rifles were working well in the heat and altitude at 4,500 feet, and this bore fruit across the three days and eight individual matches at 700m/800m and 900m. GB FTR members won gold in four out of the eight stages:

Simon West 900m Match 3 - 1st place

Mike Harris 700m Match 4 -1st place

Simon West 900m Match 7 -1st place

Dan Lomas 900m Match 8 -1st Place

In the Grand Aggregate, the top GB FTR place went

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to Peter Dommett who put in consistent scores across the three days to finish 10th overall (out of 131 competitors) and received a well-deserved bronze medal.

In parallel, a tough battle was taking place in the U-25s category, and GB's Garryk Campbell ultimately took the 1st place U-25 crown, a host of stage U-25 medals and 28th Place overall in the main competition. A special mention also goes to the youngest competitor at the World Championships - 14-year old Aleessa Longhurst from Great Britain, who won a U-25 stage gold at 900m.

After a very welcome practice and rest day, the culmination of the World Championships was the International Teams competition.

Both days were 2+15s for 8 shooters in each 16-man team, at 700m/800m/900m...with

the range providing its usual heat, mirage and sunny/cloudy conditions.

In FTR, the South African team laid on a masterclass in team shooting in difficult conditions, breaking the World team record by a staggering 106 points. For all those familiar with our sport, they will understand just how close these shoots can be. But SA led from the first distance, and never looked back.

The Great Britain FTR team finished Day 1 in bronze position and maintained that position right to the end. A great team effort but could not match the range wisdom and marksmanship of the South Africans who shot a record score, and the experience of the USA team, who took silver.

- 2. USA 3462.284
- 3. Great Britain 3376.222
- 4. Australia 3312.170

# INDIVIDUAL WORLD CHAMPIONS - WHAT IT TAKES!

Have you got what it takes to become a IGRF Individual World Champion?

s with any world champion title, it takes capability, consistency and commitment, achieved through determination, coaching, excellent equipment, practice, travel, funding, support and a sprinkling of luck. There is no doubt that you need to really want to do this, but don't despair. In countries that are members of the IGRF, there are local Clubs, National Teams and International Teams all looking to provide the support and encouragement you need. The purpose of this article is to explain what's involved and to introduce you to the opportunity and the potential.

### **BACKGROUND**

The IGRF introduced Individual World Champions in 2017 at the Irish IGRF International World Championships and they have since been held in South Africa 2019 and Great Britain 2022. This built on the previous Team World Championships that had been running since 2010 and added a new dimension to Gallery Rifle. The Individual World Championships are open to everybody that enters the relevant individual open events at the IGRF World Championships.

The IGRF World Championships are held every two years, although there was a year's delay in 2021 resulting from COVID. They cycle around the IGRF members that have the appropriate facilities, which currently includes Great Britain, Germany, Ireland and South Africa. In 2022, the IGRF World Championships

were held at the Phoenix International in Great Britain. The next World Championships will be in 2024 in Germany and then 2026 in Ireland.

### THE COMPETITION

The GR Individual World Championship competition is an aggregate made up of the 1500, 50m Precision, Timed & Precision 1 and Multi-target events and is shot in at least Small Bore and Centre Fire. It may also be offered in Centre Fire Classic and Centre Fire Open according to local conditions. This spread of events was chosen to demonstrate capability across a variety of GR skill sets including precision, rapid fire, positional and distance changes, shooting under time pressure, different target formats and stamina. You don't have to win every event, as it's the aggregate that counts, but a World Champion will lose relatively few points off the maximum available.

### THE HISTORY

There have been three World Championships to date with individual World Champion competitions.

2017 – Ireland. 2019 – South Africa. 2022 – Great Britain.

### 2017 IGRF WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS - IRELAND

The first IGRF Individual World Champions were Ray Holohan (Small Bore) and Jeff Kehoe (Centre Fire),

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both from Ireland. This looks like a home nation slam dunk, but was far from it.

The Small Bore results: Ray Holohan was victorious, but Flippie van Tonder was a very close challenger. They both scored 2185 points, but Ray had just 6 more X's! When you're looking at a total point availability of 2220 and 234 X's, that was incredibly close. The big surprise in these results is the low scores of the top three competitors in Multi-Target. It is possible that the conditions on the range impacted the scores, but it is certainly one to practice.

The Centre Fire results: In the Centre Fire, the challengers to Jeff Kehoe both came from Great Britain and it was again very close. It didn't go down to X's, but there was only 7 points separating first and third and Jeff's 50m Precision made the difference. 50m Precision is not a popular discipline, but it is well worth building it into your competition schedule if you aspire to be an IGRF Individual World Champion.

### Given the nature of this class, the scores were much more varied and Nico Roets showed off his prowess with a win by a significant margin

### **2019 IGRF WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS** - SOUTH AFRICA

There were individual World Championship competitions not just for GRSB and GRCF, but also GRCF Classic and GRCF Open. This was a very challenging event, with soaring temperatures and logistic issues with ammunition. This didn't put people off though and it was still closely contested.

The Small Bore results: This truly was a slam dunk for the hosts South Africa, with Nico Roets taking the title. However, Dan O'Flaherty and Gary Bowden were very close behind with 2169.124 and 2169.121 respectively. The scores were a little down on those in Ireland, but given the conditions, they were remarkable.

The Centre Fire results: This was a closely fought competition, with David McCarthy from Australia just beating Heinrich Straus and Jeff Kehoe. However, Daniel Blagojevic and Hercules Louw were snapping at their heels, but just needed another 2 and 4 points respectively. The Centre Fire scores were also a little down on those in Ireland, but given the heat, that was not surprising.

The Centre fire Classic results: This was the first time that an individual World Championship had been held for Centre Fire Classic (Iron sights) and there were some impressive scores. David McCarthy was again victorious with Jeff Kehoe hot far behind. Meik Waldvogt pipped Rob Wheeler to third by just 2 points, despite having 22 less X's! I expect Rob would be practising his 50m Precision for the next time around.

The Centre fire Open results: This was also a first time that an individual World Championship had been held for Centre Fire Open. Given the nature of this class, the scores were much more varied and Nico Roets showed off his prowess with a win by a significant margin.

### **2022 IGRF WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS** - GREAT BRITAIN

The most recent IGRF World Championships were held in Great Britain as part of the Phoenix Meeting in May 2022. This had been delayed by a year as a result of the pandemic and was particularly challenging for overseas competitors bringing their firearms and ammunition. The fact that international travel had been suspended meant that you had to be determined in order to meet all the requirements and get the appropriate paperwork completed. I'm pleased to say that Germany, Ireland and South Africa all fielded teams. Unfortunately, this was not possible for Australia and we're looking forward to welcoming them to the 2024 IGRF World Championships in Germany.

The Individual World Championships follow the standard aggregate of events, but each host nation > adds a little of their own flavour. Great Britain offered GRSB, GRCF and GRCF Classic, with additional prizes for top lady finisher and top Under 25 finisher. The idea behind this is to encourage more lady and young shooters into the sport.

The Small Bore results: This was an incredible performance by Jake Mossom, smashing previous GRSB World Championship scores and romping to victory with a clear 14 point lead. Having said that Keith Kilvington was unlucky not to score more points, having finished second, but with the most X's. This was a clean sweep for Great Britain.

The top lady finisher was Anna-Marie van Tonder (South Africa) with 2140.098 and the top Under 25 was Robert L Tonner (Great Britain) with 2160.114. A great performance by both.

The Centre Fire Results: Jonny Cormie was victorious with the highest ever score in an IGRF Individual World Championship competition. A great performance. There was a real tussle for second place with Daniel Blagojevic beating John Robinson on X count.

The top lady finisher was Anna-Marie van Tonder with 2161.108, but there were no Under 25 entrants.

The Centre Fire Classic Results: The Classic event didn't have so many entrants, but it was still strongly contested with a stunning victory by Rob Wheeler. Shooting with iron sights across these disciplines and at these distances is quite something and these were great scores from all 3 shooters.

### LOOKING FORWARD - SO HOW ABOUT YOU?

So, if you aspire to become a Gallery Rifle World Champion, you now know the events and the scores you need to be achieving. However, if you're not shooting those consistently, don't let that put you off entering. If you have a really good shoot on the day, then that's what counts and you never know.

**When and Where** - 2022 was at the Phoenix in the UK and the venue now moves to:

- 2024 Germany (usually November in Leitmar)
- 2026 Ireland (usually July)

**Preparation** – In the meantime, it's a couple of years before the next IGRF World Championships, so there's lots of preparation time. Practice with your local club, get competition practice where you can and muscle memory exercises are free! Seek out good shooters to practice with and coaching where possible.

**Make Contact** – Register your interest with your International Team and, if you're in Great Britain, register with the appropriate National Team (England, Scotland, Wales).

**Logistics** – If the World Championships are being held outside your home country, then you will need to understand the firearms and ammunition carriage and licensing laws. Seek the advice of your International Team or other fellow shooters who've made the journey recently and be prepared. These processes can take a long time and need to be rigorously followed.

The most important thing is to continue enjoying the sport and participating where you can. Good luck!  $\ensuremath{\mathfrak{G}}$

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

The latest news from NRA GR&P Discipline Rep **Ash Dagger.** 

By the time you read this article, the 2023 Phoenix will have come and gone. The Phoenix is the pinnacle of the GR&P calendar with such a wide range of competitions – I hope you were able to get there! But if not, there are plenty of other GR&P opportunities that remain this year, including the Imperial (mid July) and the Nationals in early September. There are also numerous club level events that are open to all, including Derby, SLG and the Scottish and Welsh Opens. Check out all the dates and results so far at www.galleryrifle.com

If you are new to GR&P and need some development before you feel able to compete, we run skills development days at Bisley - the next being October. This allows newer shooters to understand what is involved in the sport, it provide practical advice in competing, but also the range protocols and procedures that sometimes deter newer shooters from entering. For the more able, we run advanced skills days and event specific development days - the latest being for the Bianchi match (run at the end of April). Eleven candidates, with a wide range of experience (newcomers to old hands) were taken through all of the common Bianchi matches and they received hints and tips on shooting the event, together with plenty of practice (especially on the Mover). I think it's fair to say that we spotted a couple of future potential champions that day!

From an International perspective, GB Gallery Rifle hosted teams from Germany and Ireland at the Phoenix – competing for the trophies in both GRSB and GRCF 1500 events (results on the galleryrifle. com website). The GBGR captain, Morne

van Dalen, has also selected his teams for a return match in Ireland in early July. And, at the end the year, the squad will compete in the final International in Germany; both matches will be hotly contested.

In preparation for the inaugural GB handgun teams World Championships in Sweden (in August), the new handgun Captain, Dave Harris, has also announced his squad. They are:

Unfortunately, the handgun team are still prohibited from conducting any UK mainland practice sessions with the firearms they will use, but there are overseas hosts that do provide such opportunities (and of course, there continues to be a raft of LBP/R events in the UK). We also hope to host some handgun focussed training sessions over the coming months. To have an officially NRA endorsed GB team is an achievement in itself and the current squad have already proved themselves worthy of the status at informal events over the past few years. Good luck to them in Sweden.

Looking forward to next year, the process for the next Handgun captain starts again in earnest. That person will likely stay in post for 2 years, to enable the development of a strong team for the following World Championships, in 2025. Details on the process (which starts now) and the required form will be found under Notices in this Journal.

If you want to be considered as a shooter in either the gallery rifle or handgun squads, then there are three key criteria for selection:

- Capability The ability to achieve the high scores required in International shooting
- Consistency A track record that demonstrates repeatable high performance in competition
- Commitment The willingness to support the Team at home and abroad

again due to travel North to field informal teams. History declares the fate of both the 2020 and 2021 meetings in abeyance - no need to dwell! The next opportunity to shoot therefore was the mid April date in 2022. This eventually realised itself as a Scotland v England head to head affair. As before it was classed as an informal match due to the number of England shooters in

attendance. We did have 66 Home Countries enough shooters to also include LBP and LBR teams though. Scotland again took top honours throughout. A note

Arrangements for the 2020 match were well underway with England and Wales shooters

luxury of dropping the lowest score from each half of the match. Using this format it should be appreciated teams of 8 can be fielded – four shooting each gun type with all scores counting. Dropping to less than 8 people would involve overlap shooters - people shooting both gun types across the teams. This is acceptable but has to be agreed by all team captains and as a result the match is also declared as 'unofficial' - for honours only.

### **THE 2023 TOUR**

For the 2023 Scotland tour it was decided to advertise and encourage participation earlier in the year. The JSPC organisers also fixed the date slightly earlier in the year than usual. The first weekend in April, 1st and 2nd, was calendared - only a week after the first Bisley GRAW the weekend before. It was an early organisational concern. Nevertheless for the first time England managed to find a full touring team with 11 shooters deciding to sign up. The Welsh were unfortunately unable to make the trip so it was a Scotland v England head to

head competition again. It was declared an official and formal match with full teams from both nations able to be fielded.

With 11 shooters travelling England were able to field full non overlapping teams of 10 for the main aggregate rifle match. As usual this consisted of the T&P1 and Multi-Target events, both GRCF and GRSB gun types, top 4 scores to count and aggregated to a single total. The standard format.

Encouragingly, pistol shooting is continuing to show growing popularity within the UK GR&P community. On that basis it was also decided to run official individual LBP and LBR matches to the same format. Overall, three trophies were contested, the rifle HCM and the individual LBP and LBR awards.

Physical range space and time at the JSPC mean it is difficult to squad head to head team lines consistently. The general format of the weekend was concurrent team shooting whereby individual scores are extracted to produce the team score. This is also a standard methodology and used at many meetings including the Phoenix.

### **RESULTS**

The full set of results can be found on the JSPC **jointservicespistolclub.com** and **galleryrifle.com** websites. The JSPC offers 15 individual events at their Spring weekend meeting across the four main gun types of GRCF, GRSB, LBP and LBR along with a GRCF classic class. Spanning

those 15 individual matches England shooters came out of the competition extremely successfully by topping 13 of the results lists.

This high level of individual shooting contributed to a successful overall England team performance which is the best a touring squad has performed in Scotland. Although losing the centrefire half of the Home Countries rifle match. consistent and solid scoring in the GRSB matches meant the result was in England's favour by nearly 50 points. The independently shot LBP and LBR team honours were shared - England taking LBP and Scotland LBR.

Many thanks go to our hosts at the JSPC and the Scotland Gallery Rifle squad for an enjoyable weekend of competitive shooting.

### IBIS OPEN MEETING

his year we were unable to get the ranges we wanted and we finally settled on 2+10 at 900 and 1000 in the morning and a Kings II in the afternoon. This was for TR only, as the F-class league clashed for most F-class competitors. In spite of these changes, we were pleased to get 46 entries.

The morning began really quite cold with a threat of rain that fortunately did not materialise. In spite of some wind movement from the start at 900 yards and the earliness of the season, scoring was high with seven 50s and eight 49s. Keirin McCamley (Surrey) started as he meant to continue with 50.9, with Peter Griggs, Ibis Captain, alongside on the same score. Things got a little more difficult at 1000 yards and not even Keirin scored a possible, with his 49 being one of only five. Trevor Bryan (Altcar) led with 49.8. The Long Range aggregate was tight at the top, with Keirin winning on 99.15 ahead of a flock of six 98s. Trevor Bryan came second with 98.13, edging out James Postle (Old Epsomians) on 98.12.

Moving to Century after lunch, we found a light tricky wind, illustrated by the relatively low scores at 300 yards - only three 50s and eight 49s. The leader was Robert Edwards (North Herts) with 50.6. Top score at 500 yards was Richard Hirst (Huddersfield) with 50.7. Then things steadied up at 600 yards with six possibles, led by a 50.7 from Roger Ellis of Huddersfield.

The winner of the Short Range aggregate was Rob Lygoe (Dursley) with 148.17, counting out Reg Roberts (Ibis) with 148.15 and Rupert Fitzsimmons (Master i/c at Uppingham School) with 148.12.

The Long Range aggregate was tight at the top, with Keirin winning on 99.15 ahead of a flock of six 98s




From the scores given so far, the aggregate winner is not obvious (though there is a hint!). In fact it was Keirin McCamley with 246.28, followed by Reg Roberts with 245.29 and Martin Liversage (Altcar) with 244.25, who had one more V-bull with his 98 at Long Range than Bob Shaw (Ibis). There were four under-19 shooters, two each from Uppingham School and Oakham School with the top-scorer being Jeremy Tsai from Uppingham on 221.14. He wins a £30 HPS voucher, thanks to the generosity of our sponsor.

At the jovial prize-giving in the Clubhouse, Keirin received the Cup from Club Captain, Peter Griggs. The top scorers at Long, Short and the Aggregate selected from more £30 HPS vouchers and a range of bottles and chocolates which were also available to pre-selected lower places in the list. Peter thanked the organiser (yours truly) and the range staff; the organiser thanked Peter and David Smith for their work on the Stats which they fitted in around their shooting. Peter said the Ibis Open worked well on the day before the Three-Counties 'Cobweb Buster' in which many were also competing this year.

s our late Queen wisely said "memories tend to vary" or words to that effect. Having said that, I am not about to question Gordon Johnston's memories which in fact reveal the excellent way in which Clifton got it's shooting act together after the war.

Why I mentioned that was that I have some memories passed down to me by a good friend when were both in the TA in 56 (London) Armoured Division – he in the cavalry and I in the RASC.

Apparently, it is claimed that the Imperial Yeomanry were set up after a "boosy" lunch at Bisley in the late 90s as it became apparent that the Boers were leading a right old dance blowing up parts of railway on which the supply of food, ammunition on which the British troops were dependent were being cut off. So a group of horse riding men got together and formed a unit sent out to South Africa in an effort to suppress this unwelcome activity.

These self appointed recruits were welcomed, particularly by the locally formed Railway Pioneer Regiment which spent their time rushing from incident to incident doing repairs to the track.

The Imperial Yeomanry as it got named really caught on and at their peak were said to number 72,000 volunteer personnel when they turned out to be effective in suppressing some of the Boer raids so it seems Bisley made a significant contribution to the British war effort.

There is a lot more of a personal nature to this story but not to take up space in the NRA Journal which is presumably just for rifle shooting and Bisley.

So I move on to 1946/47 when Bisley Ranges, continuing their military use, were made available to Cadet and civilian shooters. At the time I was at Epsom

College where we had a 30 yard outdoor full bore range used by the Home Guard to which we were supposed to volunteer when we reached 16 years old. Those were the days when all we had were issue SMLEs, mostly with just flip up rear sites and no lateral adjustment, so we had to aim off when allowing for wind.

So there was general delight when we could go to Bisley to shoot and slowly we adapted to open range conditions. We worked on a sandwich lunch eaten in the Epsom Coaches bus on the way. Sometimes quite difficult as the so-called buses were old Army Bedford OYs with the cargo bit replaced by a mocked up passenger body, still with the cross country cargo springs in place – not conducive to a smooth ride for us or our rifles which were stacked on the floor. Of course the seats were wooden slatted and numbing!

Our SSI was a Sergeant in one of the Guards Regiments who had had some cushy number in Cairo – never wore boots or anklets, just highly polished brown shoes.

He produced little round target painted discs with a central hole on sticks which we used by lying down, facing the firer, having made sure he didn't have a round in the breech, then he shot at the disc and we who were holding the disc then told him where his mythical shot had gone. I know it sounds awful but with the limited opportunity that we had, it wasn't a bad system.

Thus we began to settle down to regular visits to Bisley and slowly our SSI managed to get back sights with lateral adjustment.

Then, ever so slowly, No.4 rifles began appearing from Canada – 2 to a wooden case if I remember rightly, and submerged in a sea of grease which we had to dispose of before they could be used.

As far as I can remember, the working parts were just clamped to the woodwork and no bedding at all.

Meantime, as the one man who had an inkling of what was going on, my Colonel made me Captain of my RASC TA unit shooting team where we learnt to aim off as we just had flip back sights.

We had a number of happy days out shooting into the South Downs at Storrington Ranges and when the 56 Div annual rifle shoot came round, we came top above all those fancy London TA Regiments and did it again the next year. This goaded them into doing something about it and we didn't clean up again but it was great while it lasted.

Meantime Epsom College had started entering schools vets matches and I got caught for some. I well remember being coached by an RAF Wing/Comdr who instructed me to move my sites right or left, I cannot remember, which I was unable or refused to do, telling him I was aiming off instead as I was sure he was wrong and my correction did the trick . I must have been a terrible person to coach.

For the first schools meeting that I attended, we were accommodated in circular bell tents on the left of the main drive into camp. The bell tents were erected for us, presumably by the military support unit.

We were allocated this accommodation on the basis of 8 cadets per tent, lying with our feet to the centre pole. The tent opened along a slit from the centre pole to the pegged outer edge of the canvass on the ground. This worked in theory for 7 cadets but one had to sleep under the entrance slit which was laced up but taught me never to be the last arrival as I discovered when it rained.  $\odot$ 

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neaking to some of the Croatian F Class team at the GBFCA F Class Euros in September 2022, I was informed that they shoot F Class .22 in Croatia at 100 yards. They were surprised when I said we shoot Long Range .22 out to 600 yards.

After an exchange of email addresses, I was invited to go out to visit their range at Osijek in the East of Croatia and during October & November, a number of emails were passed arranging the trip.

At this point an apology is made due to not having a keyboard to bring out the exact use of the Croatian alphabet.

Osijek is the 4th largest city in Croatia with around 100,000 population and sits on the River Drava. The city is a mix of very old, dating back over 500 years, and also new, sometimes next to each other, and much of the architecture is Austro/ Hungarian period but is a really nice clean city with plenty of green spaces, the most of any city in Croatia, and bars which are also plentiful which are great to allow you to rest, take in your bearing and appreciate some of the local beverages.

The range at the North West end of the city is in the Pampas sports complex and ranges from 50m to 300m and overlooks the River Drava. Not many Brits know of the shooting in Croatia and I was honoured to be asked to go out, shoot in their competitions and also represent the Long Range Rim Fire Club, however the LRRFC logo could also be adapted to Long

I was collected from Zagreb airport by my hosts Marko Susnjar and Borna Cutic whose generosity and friendliness is a tribute to the true brotherhood of shooters in making competitors from another country so welcome. Marko is a regular at Bisley in the FClass Euros meeting in September. We then drove to Osijek, just under 3 hours from Zagreb, some 300km, where we settled into our hotel in the centre of the city before having a look around Osijek in the evening.

Croatia is still getting used to using the Euro having changed over less than 5 months ago from the Croatian Kuna which was about 8.5 to the GBPound. Getting currency converted before arrival was much easier with the Euro, freely available both in the UK and also in Osijek although most places accepted card payments.

Osijek is an old city with a Fortress Complex, Tvrda, and a public square, Trg Ante Stacevic square, Trg, in Croatian

means - square, with only 3 sides, so maybe a 'public triangle' and Ante Stacevic was a politician and writer and thought to be the 'Father of the Nation'. The city still shows some evidence of the war from the early 90's. There is a monument of defiance where a Fico (Fiat 500) is driving up the front of a Yugoslavian tank next to the junction where the act took place. This represents the defiance when the tank of the Yugoslavian National Army was commanded to drive over the Fico that stopped and blocked the tank, similar to the act of defiance we all saw in Tiananmen Square in China. There are some buildings with evidence of the shooting that went on. Fortunately, Osijek, as has Croatia, has moved on and is now a cosmopolitan city. Croatia is a model of how to come through a conflict or war and regenerate itself.

Osijek was the first place in Croatia to have a tram system, dating back to 1884 and was electrified in 1926, the other city in Croatia now having a tram system is Zagreb. Recommended and staying in Hotel Waldinger, dating back to 1884, highly recommended, it was just a short walk from Cathedral of St Peter & St Paul. a brick-built cathedral due to the shortage of local stone and Ante Stacevic 'square'.

Osijek is a very safe place to visit as there is negligible problems with crime and theft.

Originally offered to go to Croatia to see the range set up, ended up that I had been entered into the Kahles F Class International Meeting, shooting .22 at 100 metres and .308 at 300 metres. Like many countries in Europe, they are restricted on ranges and only have 300 metres available to them. I was offered to use Marko's Anschutz rifle with MOAB sight mount and Sightron SIII scope and





ammunition for the .22 match at 100 metres and also his Full-bore F Class FTR with his 'special' handloads for the 300 metres match whilst in Croatia which saved the initial question regards permits and transport with rifles. That avenue of questions was to be asked for proposed future visits.

The shooting range at Pampas on the West of Osijek is a large shooting complex incorporating shotgun, pistol and rifle. The firing points are all covered with plenty of viewing space to the rear. The range is a baffled range and due to restrictions & regulations the side needs

a berm and for a 1000 yard range the berm would need to be over 200m high.

Arriving on Thursday afternoon allowed me to get a bit of relaxation prior to the practice on Friday.

The entry fee of 35 Euro per match, so 70 Euro in total, this also included breakfast, drinks, lunch and presentation dinner, this is to help those that have to travel hundreds of Kilometres to get to the range!

The weather was also much better than what I had left behind, and would return to, being in single figures, being 19–24\*C, however on the Friday afternoon, in the sun in Osijek, there was evidence of it being 36\*C, with only light and predictable breezes and generally blue cloudless skies (And yes, the secretary DID don his shorts – if only to put off the opposition!)

Saturday started at 09:00 with the .22 with 3 details at 100m before moving on to .308FTR and 4 details at 300m followed in the afternoon with F Open at 300m. The shoot is 5 minutes for unlimited

sighters followed by 15 minutes for 20 shots of .22 at 100m and 20 minutes for 20 shots at 300m.

The shoot is an individual shoot but count towards a team score, teams of 3 are made for the aggregates.

At the Pampas, they don't have any gallery ranges, so the targets are attached to the fixed frames by a dedicated butts team before the shoot then they collect the targets before laying out the next detail

There is self-squadding on pistol, IF you find you have any spare time. If you have the armoury, then it's possible to shoot in

all disciplines.

Pampas is the largest range in Croatia, mind there is a 1000 metre range, owned by the military, and like most places, you can book it, turn up and if the military want it, back home you must go!

With discussions to many of the attendees, mainly Croatians and Slovenians, it was suggested

to create a triangular challenge match for either later this year or next year.

A big thank you goes to Marko usnjar for the use of his rifles and ammunition, his transport, hospitality and generosity a true ambassador for Croatia and Croatian shooting.

Exploratory talks were made of opening up the .22 to 300 metres and although they shoot on the ISSF target this in itself made thing interesting compared to shooting on the 'modified' NRA Target Rifle targets.

A big thank you also to Kahles for organising the event and Aleš Žakelj, Target Group Manager Competition shooting at Kahles.

A very big thank you to Osijek and Croatia for their hospitality and friendliness during my stay.

The next Kahles F Class meeting is 20 / 21 October 2023 in Osijek Croatia. Individual shoots and teams of 3.

The LRRFC International Championship is on Sunday 3rd September 2023 and we are looking to many teams coming from Croatia and Slovenia

## **1ST SPRING OPEN**

unday broke to a pleasant morning, however, very cold, but not as cold as it had been earlier in the week when Bisley had a quick 5 inches of snow deposited upon it. Fortunately, it stayed dry until we left after the prize giving. We can control many things, from target booking, butt marker booking, accommodation, the one thing we can't book is the weather and to have a shoot in early March, it is a real lottery, so well done Mr Secretary!

With a few members staying over from the Training Day on Saturday, we were able to go and set up on Short Siberia at 200 yards at 07:30 and waited for the onslaught of sleepy-eyed members that had driven up, down or across that morning. We then moved equipment the short distance to the 200-yard firing point.

A good turnout of 29 members came to the 1st Spring Meeting with one 'booking in' at 07:34 on the morning of the shoot!

The winter 'break' hadn't been kind to some of the members and forced their absence, we missed some of our regular attendees. Get well soon and we look forward to seeing you back on the point soon.

We were due to shoot twice at 200 yards with the first shoot preceded with a minute of blow offs then 2 convertible sighters and 20 to count. After an initial short set back, we were able to start the shooting and work out what the wind was doing. At the start of shooting the temperature was a chilly 3\* and a fluctuating breeze running from 3½ MOA left to 2 MOA right.

With only 3 details, turnround time was short before the second spell at 200 yards. Some were able to remember what happened on their first shoot and correct or improve on it for their second attempt, some didn't take the opportunity! Usually, we had

allowed competitors to request the detail they wanted, but this year we are going with shooting by discipline, so each discipline shoots together and hopefully this would eliminate the finger pointing (They were too cold!) they someone had a better detail than they did.

There were 6 scores of 90+ recorded at the first 200 yards shoot then for the second spell at 200 yards, we reduced the shoot to 2 +15 to catch up on some time from the initial setback and there were 7 scores of 65+ recorded at the second 200 yards shoot.

We were able to keep the firing point running smoothly, thanks to the RCOs. This enabled us to finish around 12:25. The rush to pack away and then started the whacky races off to the 300 yard firing point carpark to set up there and have lunch.

After lunch then we set up for 300 yards and had a short shoot of 2 + 12 before moving back to 400 yards and again had 2 + 7 again reduced to catch up on time lost due to target malfunction.

At 300 yards the wind was the biggest burden. With only a 40-grain bullet travelling the equivalent of 1200 yards for a .308 it was easy for the wind to blow it off its intended path directly to the target. Keeping shooters on their toes, windage scales were pushed to the limits and then hold over was employed to make up the difference. Depending on the detail, 12 to 25 MOA left was used and the temperature was dropping from its high of 12\*C to a chilly 8\*. Only 6 scores of 40+ (Ex 60) were recorded at 300 yards.

At 400 yards the wind was almost wiping us out due to the range of the windage scale on scopes and dioptre sights. A variation of 20 – 35 MOA was being used and many were happy to just be able to get a shot to land on the 4 foot square target! Only 1 score of 30+ (ex 35) were recorded at 400 yards where we had to use tables due to the new range orders due to the topography of the 400 yard firing point and unfortunately we were not set up for shooting from tables due to the different rifles, disciplines etc and also running short on time. Unfortunately, a few members refused to shoot off the tables?

A total of 12 shooters managed to make an aggregate of 200+, with P Jones, a new member to the LRRFC, leading the way with 225.09.

**Ammunition:** 10 rounds, in 2x magazines each of 5 rounds

- 2. Targets will make 1x 60 second exposure
- 3. When targets appear firers are to adopt the kneeling or squatting position and engage the target with 5 rounds, reload then adopt the prone position, release safety catch and engage the target with 5 rounds

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# **INTERNATIONAL MEETING 2023**

Gallery Rifle Captain.

he highlight of Gallery Rifle shooting is the annual Phoenix meeting, normally held the last weekend in May at Bisley. This sees competitors from all over the country and many other countries come to battle it out for individual places, national records, and the coveted Phoenix records. Individuals also compete to attain enough Standards points to earn a Grand Master medal.

On the last day of the meeting, we also see the international teams compete shoulder to shoulder in both Gallery Rifle Smallbore (GRSB) and Gallery Rifle Centre Fire (GRCF) 1500 matches. This is normally held on Bays C to E of Melville. Starting with GRSB, the match consists of a 10-minute warm-up at 50 metres and then going into the 150-round match over five

stages. A match normally takes around an hour and a half to complete.

This year the countries competing were Germany, Ireland and the hosts, Great Britain. Australia and South Africa did not send a team this year, saving their funds and efforts for next year's World Championships in Germany. A team consists of five competitors, with the best four out of five scores to count towards the team score. Ideally a country would field ten competitors – five each in the GRSB and GRCF teams. However, due to a variety of reasons, a country cannot always field ten separate competitors and must have some shoot in both teams. This year Germany sent five competitors

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to cover both matches, Ireland sent six to cover both and Great Britain fielded a full complement of ten competitors. The GB team included two individuals representing their country for the first time.

The matches are normally split into two sections – match 1 to 4 and finally match 5. This allows Stats to crunch the numbers after the first 4 matches to give an indication of the standings, whilst the competitors continue with the 60-round match 5. With the GRSB match going first, Great Britain had a 16-point lead after match 4, followed by Ireland. After match 5, this lead increased to 31 points. This meant we were in a strong position going into the GRCF to win the aggregate, but nothing is ever certain at this stage.

At the halfway point of the GRCF match, GB was leading that match by 19-points. With Germany in second place, the GB team were working hard at staying calm and focusing on the next shot. At full time GB extended that lead to 45-points, giving them a 76-point lead in the aggregate. A hard fought and well-deserved win by the GB team!

Notable performances are listed in the table to the left.


It was a pleasure hosting the international teams at Bisley this year, with everyone enjoying the customary German evening at the Spott on the Friday,

ifteen members of the Scotland Gallery Rifle & Pistol Squad travelled to the NRA Shooting Centre Bisley from 24th to 28th May to compete in the 26th Phoenix Meeting. In total there were over 430 competitors, who submitted upwards of 3,500 scorecards.

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# Developments at BISLEY SHOOTING GROUND & NATIONAL CLAY SHOOTING CENTRE

2023 updates from the two grounds.

s we move further into 2023, I can report we have had an exciting year so far, with many new developments taking place at Bisley Shooting Ground (BSG) and the National Clay Shooting Centre (NCSC). I have also been reflecting on last year's endeavours, which was our first full year trading since the pandemic. Despite rising prices across many areas of the

economy, clay shooting seems to be steady, and people are still keen to enjoy the thrill of both competition and corporate events.

From a business perspective both BSG and NCSC have experienced remarkable success over the past year. I am pleased to say what was once a competitive relationship has developed into a collaborative partnership, paving the way for the sharing of resources and expertise. This synergy has led to enhanced operational efficiency and

cost-effectiveness for both grounds. By working together, we have been able to offer our customers access to a wider range of facilities and experiences, creating a real sense of community and shared purpose across both businesses.

As part of our new collaboration, BSG and NCSC recently ran their first "All Round" Club shoot together. This event combined elements of both businesses into a single competition. The shoot consisted of 25 sport trap and 25 English sporting at BSG, and 25 Down the Line (DtL) and 25 Skeet at NCSC. Although some of the disciplines may have been unfamiliar to the regular club shooters, it provided an opportunity for them to try new shooting disciplines and broaden their skillset. Our monthly club shoot has become so popular now that there is regularly a waiting list. Please book early to avoid disappointment.

The continued demand for clay shooting has allowed us to reinvest into the business again this year. We have made more improvements to Council Club, by converting the old dining room store into a fully functioning bar. This now enables us

to run two events concurrently when one group is eating, another group can be welcomed into the lounge. The lounge has also undergone a major refurbishment this year as it was particularly tired and needed additional capacity to cope with the increasing numbers during events. We have transformed the old store at the back into a sleek coffee area which now gives our customers a high-quality coffee offering from our new machine.

The lounge area has undergone a complete redecoration, including a reinforcement of the old Victorian floorboards which were beginning to cause issues. To accommodate the anticipated busy corporate season, we have also expanded the seating area and upgraded the bar facilities.

Recently, BSG and NCSC were closed for two days across both sites due to a large filming contract. This downtime was utilised to accelerate some of our planned refurbishments, ensuring that customers will have an even better experience upon their return. If you happen to visit BSG's car park, you'll notice a recent addition: the new Buggy Barn. This new feature provides a secure storage and charging area for our newly refurbished and branded buggies. These have been painted in the distinct BSG colours by one of our colleagues at Beenham Body shop, a local business owned by the proud parent of Katie Essex, a promising 14-year-old Olympic skeet shooter who trains at NCSC.

Customers can now enjoy a more comfortable and stylish experience as they move between the different shooting ranges on site. At NCSC, a trial installation of netting has been set up to protect DtL shooters from flying clay debris,



particularly when the wind is coming from the north. This is all in preparation for the increased DtL events planned in for the latter half of the year.

The collaboration between BSG and NCSC continues to strengthen, with the British shooting team training their "world class programme" athletes at NCSC, with several NCSC members now being selected for the GB team. Additionally, BSG and NCSC now serve as the army team training base for both the Olympic and home disciplines. •

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#### NEW CHARGES FOR USE OF THE DEFENCE TRAINING ESTATE

The new prices for facilities fees and training area operatives will come into effect on 1st July, full details are available on the NRA website here nra.org.uk/new-charges-for-nra-club-use-of-mod-ranges

The key changes are:

The Licence Fee has increased to £210. Applies with immediate effect and reflects increased processing costs.

Training Area Operative fees have increased by approximately 10%, the hourly rate for a weekend booking is now £64.37 ex VAT.

A Landmarc Operative is required for a SARTS booking.

Facility Fees have increased by approx. 12% the charge per lane including one target is £42.64 applicable to Gallery Ranges and SARTS Ranges. Indoor range fees have increased to £71.50 per lane reflecting increased maintenance costs. Where possible clubs are encouraged to co-ordinate bookings with other users to spread the costs.

Military ranges throughout the UK are busy driven by the ongoing commitment to deliver training for the Army of Ukraine and other forces. We anticipate that this will continue throughout 2023.

Weekend range bookings for NRA Clubs will be restricted to 24 or 12 weekends per year at the following sites;

SENTA 24 weekends, Rogiet Moor 12 weekends, Kingsbury 24 weekends, and Sealand 24 weekends. Similar restrictions are in place on other sites in the Wales and West Midlands region.

# DOCUMENTATION AND QUALIFICATIONS

The Home Office does not remind Clubs to renew the Home Office Approval (HOA). The Club official responsible for the HOA should allow adequate time for the renewal process prior to expiry. Follow up with Firearms Licencing at the Home Office team in Croydon may be prudent to expedite the process.

Clubs that hold a MoD range licence (DE Form 5665) Club must comply with the terms and conditions of the licence, which include the provision of a NRA, NSRA or MLAGB, approved and qualified Range Conducting Officer. The Club official that signs the licence

to accept the terms should ensure that members are familiar with the terms and comply. Failure to do so may result in the termination of the licence.



#### **HME FIREARMS ON DEFENCE ESTATE RANGES**

The groundwork at Warcop for the new range is complete; detailed work on range documentation for the range approval process is in progress. Repairs and maintenance to Serial 45 at Lydd will continue in the coming months and the range will re-open in November 2023. •

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
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# Obituaries



r Brian Richard Shouler (born 24th October 1943) a NRA Life member, North London Life member and Nottinghamshire shooter sadly passed away peacefully on Nov 2nd 2022 after a long fight with Myelofibrosis. Brian is survived by his wife, Rosemary and his three sons, Mark, Richard (Rick) and Simon and grandchildren, Emma, Rachel, Sam, Alex, Harrison, Billy and Eva.

Whilst Brian attended Oakham School and got his school colours, he got them in swimming and was in fact a late comer to rifle shooting. Brian started shooting in his late twenties at Freelancers Rifle Club, shooting .22 target rifle from 1971. Brian fell in love with the sport immediately and quickly picked up a 7.62mm target rifle, where he went on to represent Nottinghamshire.

Brian was a huge influence for so many within Nottinghamshire shooting. Brian introduced a large number of beginners to the sport, who have continued long shooting careers, many of whom are still shooting today. Brian also enjoyed coaching and developing other shooters including his three sons. Brian's coaching enabled his sons to represent the Nottinghamshire County Team, England and Great Britain

(including a Queens Prize Winner!). He was also key to the development of many other shooters who would later represent Great Britain, England and Nottinghamshire County.

Brian spent 17 years as Chairman of Freelancers Rifle Club and was a key part of the committee of the Notts Rifle Association for many years. He will most likely be remembered for his fantastic organisation and growth of target rifle shooting both regionally and at Bisley.

Brian's warm, friendly character encouraged many shooting friends to join him and Rosemary at many Bisley held BBQ's, with high attendance. They hosted most of the team BBQ's at the Inter Counties, the Bisley Imperial and at the end of season. Brian has delivered countless fantastic after dinner speeches, where he invariably could not finish his speech without crying with laughter at his own jokes. We have been told by many shooters and friends that the room was brighter with Brian's presence.

Brian was well known for being a larger

than life character and those who knew him could not deny his infectious laughter and could not help but be drawn into his stories and especially his jokes. His laugh could often be heard on the North London veranda echoing out along club row; Brian's favoured place on Bisley. Brian could be often found on the Veranda of the North London Rifle Club enjoying a nice cool pint with his dogs, friends and family around him. Celebrating a good days' shooting and for commiseration for those less triumphant.

Brian was a very keen sportsman.
Ranging from Sailing, Scuba diving,
Water sport's, Shotgun Shooting but his
favoured sport was Target Rifle at Bisley,
surround by his Bisley family. Brian
was always the discerning gentleman,
kind to the core and was happiest when
surrounded by most of people.

Brian is very much missed by Rosemary, his three sons, grandchildren and so many, many friends which is a testament to Brian's warm and loving nature. Bisley just will not be the same without you!



# **Dusty Miller 1930-2023**

usty Miller's death on 29 March, 2023, just before his 93rd birthday, really seems like the end of an era. He was actually Malcolm Andrew Miller but very few, of even his closest friends, would have known that, he was always just 'Dusty'.

Dusty was among the revivalist Muzzle Loaders who were rediscovering a lost art and he took part in many of the 'firsts' of that revival. He came second in the initial 900yd shoot using his McCririck match rifle and had bought his three-band LAC before it was 100 years old.

Dusty had a phenomenal memory for names and dates and a historian's interest in research and the connections between things.

He was a fount of stories: from his father's generation (a signaler in the Fusiliers on the Western Front), and from the generation of Second World War veterans who he met as a National Serviceman in the REME and then afterwards as the signwriter of the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst.

Dusty supplemented his pay by submitting cartoons to 'Punch' and other journals. He said that this earned him enough to buy the plot of land in Blackwater on which he self-built his bungalow. He was a skilled craftsman and the oak framing that forms the front wall of the bungalow has perfect joints, even after decades of weathering.

As well as accumulating a fine collection of firearms he had restored early motorcycles, and he scoured postcard fairs for items relating to military or local history.

He was physically fit until a couple of months before the end and mentally agile till the last.

At the time of writing, there have been three 'end-of-the-month' Bisley shoots without Dusty being there. He was usually



the first to arrive and put up the targets and then often had some new acquisition or piece of research to show. Dusty was intelligent and perceptive but never judgmental of the flaws of others. Always cheerful and helpful, he leaves a huge gap and lots of very good memories.

His wife died in May 1999 and he is survived by his daughter, Jan, who looked after him and whose care enabled him to stay at home right till the remarkably peaceful end of his final illness.



Richard had several interests in his life, and with target rifle shooting he had a long and distinguished involvement.

He started shooting in the early 1950's as a pupil at Magdalen College School, Oxford, where he was also a keen and effective rugger player. He gained his shooting 'colours' in 1953, and was Captain of Shooting 1955 and '56. He continued when a student at St Edmund Hall, Oxford University and on leaving university he played a leading role in the Ricochet Rifle Club (RRC), the club for Old Boys of Magdalen

College School.

At his first job after leaving University, a post in the research laboratory of Bexford Limited near Manningtree in Essex, he met and subsequently married Cheryl, who survives him.

Richard did a huge amount over the years to build up the RRC in terms of the number and the successes of its members. For many years Richard & Cheryl's caravan at Bisley was the unofficial 'club house' of the RRC. Richard was successively RRC Captain from about 1961 to 1996, Chairman from 1990 to 2008, and President from 2015 until his death.

Richard's successes as an individual shooter were legion, in National Rifle Association (NRA) competitions, Oxfordshire Rifle Association (ORA) competitions, and of course RRC competitions. His greatest success was at the British Commonwealth Club

shoot at Bisley in 1982 when he won the Kiwi competition with what was, at the time, believed to be the first perfect 75 out of 75 score at 1000 yards in an open, uncoached, competition. He was also a member of the ORA county team that, in 1971, won both the County Short Range and County Long Range matches at Bisley.

He was five times in the final of the Queen's Prize: 1965, 1968, 1971 when fellow Ricochet Mick Stevens won, 1986, and his highest place was 9th in 1984 when his work assistant at National Adhesives – David Richards – won! He was also 14th in the final of the St George's competition in 1965.

Richard shot regularly in the ORA full-bore team and was the County fullbore captain for about 20 years. He was the Oxfordshire County champion in 1978 and 1984, and he won

the ORA long range meeting in 1980

As captain of the Ricochet Rifle Club team, the Club won the county stage of the Astor competition at least 16 times between 1963 and 2016. In the Astor final the club's best result was 2nd in 1988. He led RRC teams to success in the national Lochboisdale competition in 1978 and regionally, winning the Baker Cup in 1983, '84, and '89. In the RRC's own competitions, Richard won club trophies 21 times between 1963 and 2003.

Richard's other main interests were Essex County cricket matches and philately. He had a very comprehensive and well annotated collection of stamps, and specialised in stamp series issued by European countries.

Having been designed and created by Jacky Lamb, with input from further members of the GR&P working party, namely Sophie West and Charles Murton these crib sheets are sure to be a great asset to all levels of ROs and shooters

The sheets provide at a glance information, including the course of fire, number of rounds required and range commands, and pictures of the actual targets to be used. This is a key feature, as it allows ROs and shooters who are new to the competitions to feel more at ease and familiar when they arrive at the shooting line. There are safety notes and roles of the range officer included, so you know what is expected of you and others. The crib sheets show you when to use a scoring gauge and how to do so, foot fault lines and starting positions. One great safety element is that the crib sheet also shows you how to clear a firearm and the safety commands in the event of an emergency.

The crib sheets list a colour coded event number that match the score card colours used in NRA Competitions. This is a great way to make sure the right firearms and sight combinations are being scored on the right cards. The event crib sheet will also allow you to have the information you need to programme any electronic devices to run your range, the timings for the targets to face, edge and turn for example.

A unique feature of the event crib sheets is that it includes who scores the shot targets and at what stages of the competition. The maximum score for the

competition is also present, so shooters can quickly calculate their achievements.

Feedback from an experienced shooter, Neil Roberts (April 2023), explained how since the hand gun ban in 1997 Gallery Rifle shooting has evolved into an International discipline, with many of the courses of fire developing from pistol competitions. This has meant that clubs across the country are using a variety of courses of fire and commands, these crib sheets will hopefully bring some uniformity around the country using the same National Governing Body courses of fire and range commands. This will also help

make first time club shooters arriving at Gallery Rifle and Pistol meetings more at ease with both the course of fire and the range commands.

These crib sheets will be available to download in PDF form for free from the NRA website, under the RO Portal section. They are designed to be printed on one double sided A4 page, so you can keep them in your range bags or put them up in pride of place in your club rooms and ranges. In the future we

aim to have packs available to purchase, printed on a waterproof material so that they can be used on outdoor ranges, even in the inclement British weather.

As updates occur to the NRA Gallery Rifle and Pistol Handbook, the crib sheets will be updated in line and the version updated. This way you will be able to clearly see if you have the most up to date information and replace your card as appropriate.

All Gallery Rifle and Pistol ROs, competitors and organisers should be familiar with the NRA Gallery Rifle and Pistol handbook. The Crib Sheets are supplementary to the Handbook and, used together, can be a very effective tool for ROs and shooters alike.

#### **GREAT BRITAIN HANDGUN TEAM CAPTAIN**

Nominations are sought for the role of "Captain of the Great Britain Handgun Team" for 2024. (Appointments are annual, although traditionally extended to two years, where approved by Council).

It is recognized that the selection and appointment of the Captain for a Great Britain team is a highly important decision. To be appointed Captain is a great honour but it is also a great responsibility. The ability to create a winning team is not the only criterion needed for a successful Captain. The manner in which the team conducts itself, both on and off the ranges, could affect the standing of the NRA, target shooting and

indeed the country. It is therefore vital that the person selected should have the appropriate personality and skills to carry out all aspects of the task in the appropriate manner. The selection process, while being transparent and fair, should result in the appointment of someone who meets these requirements.

The criteria for selection are:

- 1. Nominees must be full Members of the NRA for a minimum continuous period of 3 years before they become eligible for nomination and must remain so during the entire period of appointment. A nominee's subscription (where appropriate) must be fully paid up at the date of nomination.
- 2. Nominations must be supported by signatures of three NRA Members who have Gallery Rifle & Pistol as one of their declared disciplines and whose subscription (where appropriate) must be fully paid up at the date of nomination. However, nominations may not be supported by any current member of the GR&P Working Group (although any member may be nominated, including members of the working
- 3. Candidate CV's and nominations should be submitted in writing, bearing original or electronic signatures of the candidate and supporters.
- 4. Nominations (Shooter CV and supporters) will be evaluated by the NRA Council during August and

Full name: Amiel Gardiner Talks to NRA

## How did you get into shooting and at what age?

I only got into shooting very recently at the age of 45. I went to a clays shoot which happened to be run by the Chairman of Pinewood Pistol Club. He suggested that I come along to the club and try out the shooting they did there. For some reason I assumed it would be shooting air pistols but that wasn't the case! When I was taken out onto the range, from the moment I fired my first .22 shot, I knew that this was something I wanted to do more of. Over the next few months, I was introduced to Gallery Rifle and was told about the competitions held at Bisley. I have always taken part in competitive sport of some kind and had been looking for something new to compete in and this is how it all started.

# What is the most memorable moment in your career?

I am only midway through my third season of competitive shooting but there have definitely been some highlights already. My first one is finishing my first detail in competition at Autumn Action in 2020, the feeling I got from that confirmed that competitive Gallery Rifle shooting was for



me. Next was being the highest Lady Shooter for the GRSB National Champion Aggregate in 2022. And then this year, being included in the Watch List for the GB Gallery Rifle Squad. I have put a lot of hard work into something I am truly passionate about and seeing the results of this is a great feeling.

## What was the biggest hurdle you had to overcome as a shooter?

Knowing when to stop at practice. It could be said that I spend more time at the range than I do at home! I am very competitive, I've always worked hard to achieve the things I have achieved in other sports, but they have been much more physical so your body usually tells you when to stop. With shooting, there isn't that same feedback so for me, it has been about finding the balance of getting the shots down the range, putting in the hard work but keeping the quality of practice and not over-shooting.

# What role does your family/friends play in your shooting?

The new friends I have made within shooting have been amazing, freely giving their time, knowledge, guidance and encouragement to help me to improve. Being able to celebrate successes and talk things over when things don't quite go to plan with people who understand is invaluable and I am very grateful. My family are very understanding of the amount of time I spend on the range and being away for competitions which enables me to do the things I feel I need to do to progress further.

#### What sort of music do you listen to?

A real mix of styles, but mainly songs that I can sing to in the car where no one else can hear me!

#### What Club are you a member of?

Aldershot Rifle and Pistol Club and Pinewood Pistol Club.

#### Who has been your biggest inspiration?

Not a person but an event. Watching the Gallery Rifle World Championship International Match in 2022 at Bisley. The quality of the shooting, the dedication and focus, seeing what I could aspire to achieve, seeing people competing at the top of their game and enjoying competing.

# Which is your favourite country in the world? Is it somewhere you have visited on tour?

Switzerland for holidays. I love being as

high up in the mountains as I can be. Going hiking up a mountain and being rewarded by stunning views is amazing.

# How has Bisley and the NRA influenced you?

The facilities at Bisley are fantastic. I am fortunate to live not far from Bisley which enables me to practice my gallery shooting where I compete which is great preparation for competitions. But whilst being around on camp, I have also been able to see so many different disciplines within shooting which I never knew existed and as a result I have recently bought a full bore rifle which I am enjoying learning to use.

#### What do you like to do in your free time?

Pottery, wood carving, playing guitar, walking, Pilates and yoga.

# Do you have any pre-competition routines?

I do a lot of visualisation, imagining scenarios that might occur in competition, I look at photos of the ranges I will be shooting at to familiarise myself with the set up and try and see myself shooting there. Music plays a big part in my preparation both for motivation and relaxation. And I always clean my magazines the night before competition!

# What advice would you give to somebody who wanted to take up shooting?


Try something like clays where you can do an experience day and try out shooting to see if you like it, it's accessible as you don't have to be a member of a club to do it, that's how it all started for me. Once you know you want to shoot then look for a local club. Find people within the sport that you respect and listen to their advice. The shooting community are very willing to share their knowledge and experience if you show interest and I have found this invaluable to finding my way in this sport. Whether you want to shoot recreationally or competitively, there really is something for everybody, so try out a few things and see what you like.
